relatives, and found my brother a
great sufferer.

On the 14th of January 1820-70.

I returned to London and on the
16th saw Mr. Platt about my business
affairs, and found him a lawyer!!!
the same day saw Mr. Madely on my
own business and found him the
same as he had been in my business
for the last 6 years, a lawyer!!!

On the 17th I returned to Shunley Hall
and found all well. The remainder
of this month and February passed
away without anything very

Many material occurrences, but March
appears to begin with every kind
of trouble to me and mine for
all are more or less in trouble &
some appear to have insurmountable
difficulties against them &
the whole seems combined with
threats executions & and wars to
ruin if not destroy and kill may
looked for enjoyment and being &
on the 10th among all other things
I receive a letter from my Sister
Cath. saying my beloved brother
had gone under a cruel & dangerous
surgical operation, on the receipt
of which I was afraid his eye was
lost and were confident he would

March
survive but a short time & one
month would be a long time for him
to survive. In every difficulty &
apparent trouble of my own and
family I acted & done as directed.
(to the best of my knowledge of the
Divine ways of my Shepherd & Father
by the Lord! but I could not get any
one to act or do disinterestedly for
me or mine, or a deal might
have been done which appeared better
but I have reason to believe that so
often enough it must be, that Divine or not di-
sturbed, for man has been set in the
cause of all the disorder that
is on the earth, therefore man
must bear all the evil that is

caused by disorder. some more
and some less. and it appears at
times that the most wicked (according
to our sight) have the least and that
we all do not according to their deserts
but that is not the case for Divine
Wisdom is Love. Mercy & Justice &

On the sixth of April the fifty fifth
¹⁸²⁶ anniversary of my birth I received a
6. letter from my Sister saying my Dr.
Brother had departed this life. I im-
mediately prepared and at 3 P.M set
off for Norwich on my way to London
I called on Mr. Madley and arranged
with him about J. Munro's business and
I had reason to believe it would have

been so managed as to prevent the
William Edwards from having his
ends. But no: it was in the hands
of lawyers "We unto you lawyers for
you lay heavy burdens on the people
and will not pull your finger off."
And the Revulator pronounces the
wo against the inhabitants of the earth
"Woe, woe, woe, to the inhabitants of
the earth by reason of the other vo-
ices of the trumpet of the three angels
which are yet to sound!" And
surely the voices of the three trumpets
day fare at this sounding. For self love
and the love of the world reigns pre-
dominant in the earth. that there
is none that doth justice nor

Norwich & at 1/2 past 8 P.M. arrived
at the Maiden Head Inn. Went to
my sister, & a mourned sight
presented itself. But who shall

ask the Lord what doth their? for why hast thou done this? Not me Lord! But so thou! O Lord! give me understanding and I shall love thy law and as thy doings will delight me. found preparations for the corps to leave Norwich next morning early and for us to follow in the course of the day. At 8 A.M. got the body out of the House into the House & sink it on. ordered the chaise at 2 past 12 and at one set off for Bury and at nine arrived at the house and Henry Hasted. went the Rev Mr G. Sam's to St. S. On the ninth went over to Chelmsford and returned to 10. Bury. On the tenth proceeded to

April.
12th 1811
Chelmsford to inter the remains of my late dear brother and having performed that last tribute and the body properly covered in we returned to Bury. where we remained until Wednesday evening when we had a Postchaise and arrived at Chelmsford at 8 o'clock and got on much better than expected and retired to rest at 11 P.M. on the 13 received a letter from my son Frederick and on the 22^d received a letter dated the 20^d calling me to London on the 24^d. On the evening of the 23^d set off by the Mail Coach all I had to do in Town Sat & talk off for Shunby Hall where I arrived at 9 P.M. and found all well at 10 P.M. for and Kate arrived —

Spent the evening in detailing miseries & persecutions met with by all parties and the sufferings of others, when we had to rest to go to all who were the best. I laid down all my rests by the side of my dear Vol. and rose cheerful the next morning at 8. A.M. set off for London called on Mr. Maberly and found him a lawyer called on Mr. Pitt and found him a lawyer and after doing all I could of that which I had to do, wrote a letter home and another to Joe Bunn went to sleep at the Speed Eagle in Gracechurch St. at 6. A.M. Paid 2/- April I mounted the Box of the Norwich day coach and at 7 past 2 P.M. I arrived at Bury. At 9 P.M. got to Chelmsford, related my adventures and arrived

April 25th - May 1st
to rest which I much enjoyed. Pledg'd the Lord! Any soul for me this must be
done.

I waited to note in its proper place
of the gift itself I received from Mr. Oldis
at the White Horse Shimpling Hall on the
14 of March at 10 o'clock in the evening -

From the above time of my rising
on the 28th of April nothing but
the common occurrences of life
occurred until Sunday the
7. of May when W.H.C. went to the
church (where his late husband of-
ficiated for 30 years,) and being now
come about the middle of June

1st May since she made a guest uppon
silencing the Minister and drawing
the eyes of the whole congregation
on her until she was conducted
out of the place. On Monday the
8th I began to pack the sum-
mer inreadyness to go to Bury.
Sold the Cows & calves with sum-
-ery other things keeping busy a-
bout one thing and another un-
til Saturday the 13th when I went
to Bury with W. Cornell and sold
the Hay & done other little jobs &
returned again to dinner so ended
the day retired to rest and arose on
the Morning of the 14th at 5. A.M. to
write letters to W. Kimble W. Lacy.

Bristol & Lord Middleton return-
ing them. Lordship's. W. Carter's
thanks for their lordship's great
city benevolence and great concern
for her late husband's welfare so
having performed that task at
eleven retired to rest and at 5
A.M. arose wrote to J. Ammitage

to the bankers at Bury for him to
receive in London than post
1st being to go to Bury with my sister
and 15. to look at a house for her future
residence at 9 St. Pauls S.W. 1st
